

CHURCH IN THE ATTIC



After our outdoor service on June 2nd, I was talking to Herman and Rebecca Nieuwenhuizen, and I asked them about a naval battle in 1639 that I heard mentioned recently. I asked if this was when the Netherlands received their independence.

Well, as it turns out, that naval battle was part of the 80 Years War that ended in 1648, with the defeat of the Spanish, and the independence of the Netherlands.

However, our conversation quickly shifted from the war itself, and instead led to a mention of a church in an attic. I know that the Nieuwenhuizens have seen many beautiful and majestic churches in Europe, so I was curious why they would bring up something about a church in an attic.

In an email, Herman explained the peculiar reason for the 17th century attic church in a land filled with huge churches. He said that the "Church in the Attic in Amsterdam" was where Catholics could worship without the Protestant northern region of the Netherlands knowing it. Of course, Spain was Catholic, and Protestants and Catholics were at odds like the 80 Years War itself. Only Calvinist worship was allowed in the northern part of the country.

....CHURCH IN THE ATTIC CONTINUED

Clandestine Catholic house churches could be found throughout Amsterdam, including one called "Our Lord in the Attic," located in a 1630 built canal house. The house had several exits onto different streets, as well as the roof. From the outside, the church that could contain several hundred people was completely integrated into what looked a regular albeit large corner house built along a canal. Also, in case of a police raid, the interior of the church could be instantly changed from a catholic to a protestant appearance. Finally freedom of religion was put into law towards the end of the 17th century,

The "Church in the Attic" continued to provide religious services into the 19th century. In 1887, religious services were finally discontinued and moved to a newly built church nearby. In 1888, the "Church in the Attic" turned into a museum that is open to the public daily.

It's no wonder that countless religious refugees fled to the American colonies and to Penn's Woods. And it's no wonder that our founders saw the complications in history when political and religious power were combined, thus leading to their constitutional separation of church and state.

However, it's also no wonder, in looking back throughout history, that the call of faith has led Christians, from the very beginning, to defy political persecution, even death, in order to live out that faith. May God continue to bless St. Peter's in this time of religious apathy, until God so ordains a new era in the church.



A NOTE FROM OUR MUSIC DIRECTOR


July Beacon - Thank Yous from the Concert Series
