The most interesting place to start reading the Bible is the table of contents; yes, that place at the front of the Bible with the listing of the all the books of the Bible. Let me explain....

People who understand the layout of the Bible can hear words from any place in the Bible, and go, "Oh yes, I know what that's about." That's a much better response than wondering where in the world the scripture reading is coming from. For this article, I'll give a brief description of the layout of the New Testament.

Then we have letters Paul wrote to his new Christian communities around the Mediterranean, followed by some other letters from that time. The final two chapters give us a beautiful vision of the completed work of our Redeemer God.

I hope that your Bible will be with you a little more this Lent. Its words truly offer Good News. God bless you this Lent, as we journey to the cross and to the joy of Easter morning.

# Heifer Project Gift Fair

Its Heifer Project time! Each spring, St Peter's Pikeland United Church of Christ holds a fair in support of Heifer Project International. This year Heifer Sunday is April 21, 2024.

Solving the problem of world hunger is a heartfelt vision of many people but the sheer magnitude of the problem has overwhelmed agencies.

Heifer Project International (HPI), is the outgrowth of one man with a vision and a practical method of implementation that did not require inordinate financial underwriting. After serving as a relief worker in the Spanish Civil War in 1936 Dan West observed that there was no way to bring enough food to the children of Spain fast enough to address the depravation that surrounded him daily. Mr West's concept was to bring cows to Spain to produce milk and to give a cow to a family with the stipulation that its offspring must be given to another family who would in turn give a calf to yet another family! And so on and so on!

HPI started in 1942 with the first shipment of heifers delivered to Puerto Rico in 1944.

Animals are delivered to communities all around the globe. The species are selected to serve the environment and the needs of the community. In Honduras beekeeping has brought multiple benefits to a community. The bees pollinate crops and other flowering plants. They produce honey which is sold to the local population. In addition sub industries have emerged that include a wax producing factory, hive manufacturing and honey processing factories all from one gift of a beehive.

These farmers build human bridges between communities by passing knowledge, courage and dignity. It is a success story from our local generosity and kindness. You can participate by supporting the Heifer Project at St Peter's Pikeland United Church of Christ April 21, 2024. Your contributions fight hunger and poverty around the world and changes peoples lives.

Contributions to support Heifer can be made through offerings or at the Living Gift Market table in Fellowship Hall on April 21, 2024. No Fair this year but we will have the Living Gift Market table at Fellowship Hall after services.

The Living Gift Market is a chance to change the lives of people. The gifts you can purchase include food and income producing animals like goats, bees, chicks and heifers. Heifer Project also provides the training in care of the animals and in enhancing the environment. The gifts are matched to each local environment.

# Travel Back in Time; A Trip with St. Peter's

#### Part One

Introduction – we think there is confusion about our current cemetery property – read the history below!

The Great Land Scandal – who really owned the land our church was built upon?

In 1682, William Penn petitioned King Charles II to make payment in land for a debt owed by the Crown to his father, an Admiral in the British Navy. The land was called West New Jersey, which included the land west of the Delaware River that was to later become Pennsylvania. Penn was granted a royal charter appointing Penn and his heirs "true and absolute Proprietors of a tract of land, called Pennsylvania, lying north of Maryland, south of New York". He saw the land west of the Delaware as an opportunity for his "Holy Experiment" – a Quaker colony, first called the Society of Friends of West New Jersey.

William Penn formed the three original counties: Chester, Bucks and Philadelphia. The original Quaker homesteading settlements, the Cheshire or Chester Meeting Tract, and the Welsh or Radnor Meeting Tract, were laid out between the Delaware and the Schuylkill, covering parts of present-day Chester, Delaware and Montgomery Counties.

The Quaker settlements soon went far beyond to land farther up the Schuylkill, including The Pikelands.

However, some of these properties became the tools of speculators. Dr. Daniel Coxe, Court Physician to King Charles II and friendly with William Penn, was able to obtain a land patent, together with investors Sir Matthias Vincent and Major Robert Thompson, each having 10,000 of the 30,000 acres that make up what are today four townships – East and West Pikeland, and East and West Vincent. This was one of many pieces of land involved in a grand scheme that intended to control the fur trade in beaver skins, all the way out to Lake Erie. Together with other investors they formed the "New Mediterranean Sea Company" to pursue their elaborate trading plan.
